
How applicants feel about Clearing and deferral

A record 40.5% of all UK 18 year olds have applied to University despite there being 1.5% fewer 18 year olds




Applicant numbers for nursing are up 15% year-on-year, to reach 58,550





The data suggests commitment to university choices is high



UK applicants holding a firm offer

Those holding a deferred start date have gone down by 1%

UK applicants holding a firm offer are up by 1%

Internationals firm offer holders are up by 12%


Confidence in going to university has remained stable however less confident applicants are still considering their options


Females and those from a BAME background also reported less confidence in going to university; 57% and 59% accordingly










Q9. You mentioned are thinking about deferring. What do you plan to do in your gap year?






What does the UCAS data say about motivations around Clearing?



Clearing in 2019 ... a reminder of this record breaking cycle

- A total of 73,320 applicants used Clearing to secure their place in the 2019 cycle.
- Of these over 35,000 were initially rejected by their chosen universities.
- A total of 28,030 applicants who had a confirmed place used the new online self-release. Of those, 18,690 applicants were subsequently accepted into HE
- Applicants were much more likely to self release if they were placed through their insurance choice (28% self-released) than through their firm choice (4%).
- More than half of those who did use self release (54%)
 were placed at a university they <u>had</u> applied to in the main
 scheme





UK 18 year olds with a place at a medium tariff provider were almost equally as likely to be subsequently placed at a higher tariff provider (27%) as they were at lower tariff provider (25%).



95% of those who went to a high tariff university after using self release had already applied to a high tariff university



When asked why they changed their mind....

12% I exceeded the offer conditions, so had a rethink about my options

Thought the course would be "too easy"

Wanted to be closer to home or to study in a different location location



WHAT THIS MEANS FOR PROVIDERS

Commitment to go to university is high this year, despite everything that is going on — so we have reason to be cautiously optimistic

Given the time remaining, our job is to plan communications which detail what we know about academic and social life — tailor these to the audience to build confidence

There is likely to be a smaller pool of applicants who are released by their firm and insurance choices

While sentiment suggests 'trading up' could be a trend, past behaviour does not support this



51% are now less confident about going to university — and this affects applicants' decision making, with 18% considering deferral

65% are fully committed to their UCAS choices, with only 5% not committed at all

49% want more information on how their academic life will work in practice — but this is different for different cohorts

22% say they want to use Clearing to get a 'better' course or university

The majority, however, change their mind in clearing due to factors relaying to location
