TAUGHT


- GDL/CPE one year. This is a conversion course for graduates who wish to pursue a career in law but did not study an LLB qualifying degree.
- **LLM** –one year. Allows a more specialist study in a particular area of law, following a law degree.
- MA/MSc one year full-time, two years part-time.

RESEARCH

- MRes 18 months to three years full-time.
- MSc one year full-time.
- MPhil one to two years full-time
- **PhD** three to four years full-time, seven to eight years part-time
